The Easter morning scene of St. John and St. Peter running to the empty tomb is one of urgency, faith and hope. # Oswald Cardinal Gracias Passes the Torch to Archbishop John Rodrigues

Oswald Cardinal Gracias, the former Archbishop of Bombay, has officially handed over the leadership of the Archdiocese to Archbishop John Rodrigues. Having served for nearly two decades, Cardinal Gracias leaves behind a legacy of pastoral care, interfaith dialogue and advocacy for social justice.

Appointed Archbishop of Bombay in 2006 and created a Cardinal in 2007, he played a key role in the global Church as a member of Pope Francis' Council of Cardinals. His tenure was marked by efforts to modernize Church administration, promote environmental consciousness and support the marginalized. He was instrumental in fostering communal harmony and was an advocate for the rights of minorities in India.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, his leadership ensured that parishes mobilized

resources to provide food, medical assistance and emotional support to the needy. He also strengthened Catholic education, reinforced seminary formation and encouraged lay participation in Church affairs.

Archbishop John Rodrigues, who now takes the helm, brings with him a wealth of experience, having served as Auxiliary Bishop, Rector of St. Pius X Seminary and Bishop of Poona Diocese. His pastoral approach, strong theological grounding, and emphasis on youth and family ministry signal a continuity of the Church's mission in Mumbai.

As the Archdiocese of Bombay enters this new chapter, it expresses deep gratitude for Cardinal Gracias' unwavering service while embracing Archbishop Rodrigues' vision for the future with faith and hope. Cardinal Gracias' impact will continue to inspire the Church in India and beyond.

#### Visit to the Archdiocese Heritage Museum, Goregaon Seminary

We came... we saw... and we loved it !

Who says museums are boring? According to me, all should visit the Archdiocese Heritage Museum at the Goregaon Seminary. This place actually tells us about the History of the Church, of how beautiful things were in the past and what it is now at present. It also makes us aware that we, the new generation, have to take care and preserve these things for the next generation, otherwise it will soon be outdated.

As we entered the Museum, the first thing we saw was the cruet. It is something where the water and wine is kept. It was not a simple one which we see; it had a unique design. What amazed me most was the cathedral monstrance and the other sun burst monstrance which were just beautiful. Another eye-catching piece was a broken and burnt statue which had been brought from our Lady of Bethlehem Church, Dongri.

We were also shown a short video of Pope Paul the VI visiting India for the first time!

# Deepening Our Faith: A Journey Through the Basic Liturgy Ministry Course

We, Meena D'Souza, Veena Fernandes, Phiona Vaz and Nyra-Ann Mendonca, had the privilege of attending the Basic Liturgy Ministry Course at the Diocesan Liturgy Centre, Bandra for the past 9 months. The sessions were held once a month on a Sunday. This enriching experience not only deepened our understanding of the Catholic liturgical traditions but also transformed the way we engage with the rituals of the Mass and the sacraments.

The course covered a wide range of topics, beginning with an Introduction to Liturgy and Liturgy in the CCC & Sacrosanctum Concilium, which provided us with the theological and historical foundations of the liturgy. We explored the Structure of the Mass, examining the Word and Rite, and gained a deeper understanding of The Paschal Mystery and its central place in our worship. The sessions on Celebrating the Lectionary and Liturgical Year helped us appreciate the importance of the liturgical calendar and its impact on our spiritual lives.

Throughout the course, we articulated our thoughts into assignments that encouraged

us to reflect on the practical and spiritual dimensions of each session. By the end of the course, we felt more equipped to contribute to strengthening the Parish Liturgy Cell and supporting the planning of liturgical services at Our Lady of Lourdes.

**Retreat :** A personal invitation from God for each one of us to return back to him from our sinful ways.

#### Healing the hurt feelings: Why we get hurt?

•We allow the hurt to define us. - Don't give anyone the power to define you in their image.

- •Inability to understand the offender.
- •Need to know what is in my control and what is out of my control.

•We keep too many expectations from others - We are hurt by our own expectations.

What is Forgiveness: It is giving up my RIGHT to hate you. It is a DECISION to love the offender, although FEELINGS may take a long time. 1 Peter 3:9 - Don't repay evil for evil, instead, pay them back with a blessing.

#### TO FORGIVE IS TO SET A PRISONER FREE, THE PRISONER WAS YOU!

A real forgiveness is that which is given without asking for it. Then the other person becomes the debtor.

How to heal the hurt feeling? : Healing does not usually take place instantly but is a process. Deep pain and resentment, which developed over time will take time and persistent prayer to heal. Often there are layers of hurt and resentment that needs to be uncovered in prayer. We know we are healed when we can recall the hurting experience and NO LONGER feel the pain and the resentment.

**Positive side of the wounds:** In all things God works for the good (Rom 8:28). Sometimes things that hurt the most, teach the greatest lessons. God will never take anything away from you without replacing it with something much better. **God wants us to forgive so that we might become his face in the world which has very little concept of mercy.**


