




Mary: A Model of Mission in the Church

From the very beginning of salvation history, Mary stands as a perfect model of mission in the Catholic Church. Her life, rooted in faith and obedience, reflects how God calls ordinary people to participate in His extraordinary plan. For every Catholic, and especially the youth, Mary shows how to live a life of mission - receiving, carrying and sharing Christ with the world. Mary's mission begins at the Annunciation (Luke 1:26-38). In response to the angel Gabriel, she utters her great "Yes". Mary accepts her divine mission to be the Mother of the Savior. Her fiat is not passive acceptance but an active commitment, showing that true mission starts with openness to God's will. Her mission immediately becomes visible in the Visitation (Luke 1:39-45). Mary goes "in haste" to her cousin Elizabeth, carrying Christ within her. This moment teaches us that mission is never self-centered - it is about bringing Jesus to others with joy and service.

Mary continues her missionary witness at Cana (John 2:1–11). Faced with the couple's need, she intercedes with her Son, and Jesus performs His first miracle. Here, Mary's role is twofold: she recognizes the needs of others and directs them to Christ with the words, "Do whatever He tells you." This moment reveals Mary as a model of intercession and accompaniment, guiding others toward obedience to Christ. Her mission is completed at the foot of the Cross (John 19:25–27). Standing with her Son in His suffering, Mary receives a new role from Jesus: "Behold, your mother." In this gift to John, Mary becomes the Mother

of all believers and thus the Mother of the Church. Her mission extends to every disciple who follows Christ. The Church teaches that Mary, assumed body and soul into heaven, continues her mission as Queen of Heaven. Revelation 12 portrays her as a "woman clothed with the sun," interceding and protecting the faithful in their struggle against evil. As Catholics, we turn to her intercession because she is close to Christ, and as she did at Cana. she continues to present our needs before Him. Her queenship is not about power but about service, flowing from her motherhood of Christ and her sharing in His redemptive mission. Today, she intercedes for the Church as its mother, encouraging us to live our own missionary call with courage and fidelity. Her journey invites us to say "Yes" to God, to live for Christ, and to share His love with the world.



Mission Sunday

Mission Sunday draws attention to the essence and importance of the Church's missionary activity rooted in Jesus' salvific mission entrusted to him by the Heavenly Father. Jesus entrusted his followers with a commission, "go forth and make disciples of all nations" (Mt 28:19). The Acts of the Apostles testify to the missionary activity of the Apostolic Church. For the Church in every age, to be missionary is not merely an accidental function but belongs to her very nature. God's saving word continues to be audible in the Church's proclamation of the Gospel and God's redeeming work becomes tangible in her actions.

Mary of Nazareth, the mother of Jesus actively participated in his life mission and could rightly be regarded as a model missionary. According to Lk 1:39, after Angel Gabriel revealed God's plan of salvation to her, Mary got ready and went in haste to visit and assist Elizabeth, her pregnant elder cousin living in a town in the hill country. This action manifests that Mary was truly selfless, sensitive and service-oriented. Soon after she herself conceived Jesus, she hurried on foot through hilly terrain despite the hardship this journey involved. Her haste also reflects the urgency and zeal with which she acted. Mary's presence and active assistance concretely demonstrate her personal care, love and sensitivity to her elder cousin. Her long stay manifests her true commitment, constancy and dedication. All these are characteristics of a true missionary which are truly inspiring and worthy of emulation by

all who feel called to be personally involved in the Church's mission in contemporary times.

The Second Vatican Council brought to fruition a new reflection on the true nature of the Church and its missionary activity and practice based primarily on presence and witnessing which embraces all the various forms of Christian action. Its decree 'Ad Gentes' emphasized that the Church fulfils her mission when she becomes fully and actively present among all people or nations so as to lead them by living example by preaching, by the sacraments and by other channels of grace to the faith the liberty and the peace of Christ. Pope Paul VI stressed, "For the Church, evangelizing means the Good News to all strata of humanity and through its influence transforming humanity from within and making it new". This is a shared responsibility of the whole church and all its members. The Church does indeed share in the hopes, joys and struggles of all peoples in contemporary times. All Christians are called to be the salt of the earth and light of the world in the context of his or her own life situation using our God given qualities, resources and talents by actively cooperating and supporting the evangelising, developmental and humanitarian apostolates which various forms of missionary activity in present times.

Sharing the Gospels with the World

Do you look forward to publicity about your visits or some good deeds you do? That is not Missionary Love.

Missionary Love is not just sharing Love with others, it is sharing compassionate love. That is what Mary did when she went to visit Elizabeth. Moreover, she was sharing not just her love but she was sharing the good news that she had received from the angel. In fact, she was sharing Jesus with her. What about us, do we share the Gospels when we go out in society, meeting people? We are called to share Jesus with the world, can we do that?

No Time To Wait

Have you noticed how some people don't hesitate when someone needs them? They leave everything aside and show up. It could be a friend running across the playground the moment you fall or a sibling who hears the tremor in your voice and asks, "What's wrong?" before you even find the words. This kind of haste speaks louder than words, telling you, "You matter."

That's exactly what Mary did. She had just

received a message that would change all of history, the announcement that she would bear the Son of God. In that moment, one might expect her to remain still or to contemplate this mystery in silence. Yet her first instinct was to move, and she quickly set to visit her cousin Elizabeth who was also pregnant, to share herself and the One she carried within. Her haste is not the haste of anxiety, but of love. When love perceives

She shows us in that simple journey to Elizabeth about revealing what mission truly is: to carry Christ quietly and faithfully into the lives of those who need Him.

We may not travel to hill countries or carry world-changing news, but every one of us can walk in Mary's footsteps. Each time we show up, we carry Christ into the world and whisper to others, "You matter".

A Garden, A Forever Friend - Plant Workshop

E.C.O's [Environment Cell of Orlem] first workshop, was held on August 2nd, 2025, where 30 plant enthusiasts came together and happily indulged in some plant therapy, all geared up to branch out and take root, just like the beautiful saplings they were potting in eco-friendly mud pots.

The workshop covered indoor gardening, plant propagation techniques, container planting of veggies, fruits, microgreens, herbs and other houseplants. It stressed on the importance of plants and trees, that not only supply us with oxygen, food, water and shelter but also provide other benefits by (snake plant, peace lily, spider plant etc.) absorbing harmful air pollutants like benzene, released from vehicle emissions and are a significant contributor to air pollution. It also emphasized the need to support ecosystems by protecting

our garden guardians (bees, butterflies, earthworms etc.), avoiding pesticides and planting native plants. As Pope Francis once said, "As stewards of God's creation, we are called to make the earth a beautiful garden for the human family." The workshop ended with the saplings finding new stewards and new homes, paving the way for a greener Orlem.

Mary's 'Yes' to God reveals four virtues we too can embrace:

M - Meekness. God's plans often defy human logic, leaving us powerless on our own. Meekness shifts focus from ourselves to God, letting His Spirit lead. Mary, hearing Gabriel's message, put aside her plans and surrendered to the divine. 'Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.' (Matthew 5:5)

women', Mary never sought attention. She let her Son shine while remaining in the background. Her humility contrasts with our tendency to boast in success. 'Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, so that he might exalt you in due time.' (1 Peter 5:6)

R-Reflect and Ponder. Life's chaos demands stillness. Mary consistently 'treasured all these things in her heart', seeking counsel through prayer and reflection. Likewise, when storms overwhelm us, we too can pause and let God's Word bring peace. 'From the end of the earth I call to you...

Lead me to the rock that is higher than I.' (Psalm 61:2)

Y – Yield to God's Will. Yielding means stepping out of comfort zones, letting faith override fear. Mary declared, 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word.' (Luke 1:38) Her courage rested on God's promises.

MARY: Meekness, Always humble, Reflecting, Yielding—an epitome of FAITH: Find Assurance In Trusting Him. Like Mary, we are called to say Yes, trusting that 'He who began a good work in you will bring it to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.' (Philippians 1:6)

arrived ready to assemble and present their creations on-site, using only natural, ecofriendly décor to complete their displays. The Legion of Mary Apostolate, in our Parish, has been a beacon of hope and service for many years. With 75 dedicated active members, we are actively involved in various ministries, including Eucharistic ministry, Prison ministry, Lector and Choir ministry, and Sunday school catechism.

Our Legionaries have been tirelessly visiting homes, hospitals, and institutions, bringing comfort, solace, and spiritual guidance to those in need. They have been instrumental in helping the marginalized, sick, and homebound, as well as those struggling with addiction, mental illness, and other challenges.

One of the key aspects of our Legion's work is its focus on spiritual guidance and counselling. Our members are trained to provide support and direction to those seeking spiritual guidance, and they work closely with various centers in our Archdiocese to provide counselling services. Legionaries have been actively involved

in various social and charitable initiatives. They visit homes for the destitute, orphans, and senior citizens, providing education, support, and companionship to those in need.

Prison ministry is a vital part of our work. Our members visit prisons and remand institutions, providing academic classes, art, education, dance, culinary skills, and yoga. Saint Carlo Acutis and Saint Pier Giorgio Frassati



On September 7, 2025, Pope Leo XIV canonized two young lay figures - Saint Carlo Acutis and Saint Pier Giorgio Frassati - in a solemn service in St. Peter's Square. Their lives speak powerfully to faith, youth, and service and the Pope used his homily to draw out lessons for the Church today.

Saint Carlo Acutis (1991-2006)

Born in London, raised in Milan, Carlo Acutis died at age 15 from leukemia. He was well known for his deep devotion to the Eucharist, his commitment to helping those in need, and for bridging faith and modern technology—creating a website documenting Eucharistic miracles. Carlo was beatified in 2020 after one recognized

miracle; a second was approved in 2024, which cleared the way for his canonization. He has been called "the first millennial saint" and even "God's influencer."

Saint Pier Giorgio Frassati (1901-1925)

Pier Giorgio Frassati, an Italian layman and member of the Dominican Third Order, lived a life of youthful energy, joy, and deep Christian witness. He came from Turin, was involved in social and charitable works (such as Catholic Action and assistance to the poor), and had a devotion to both faith and the natural world—especially the mountains. He was beatified in 1990 by Pope John Paul II.

Pope Leo XIV's homily at the Canonization service underscored how holiness is not limited to the clergy or reserved for older age. These two Saints show that even very young lives, lived simply but with faith through prayer, acts of charity, Eucharistic devotion - can shine. We are all encouraged all to orient life upward - to God, not to mere self-interest.

Their canonization sends a message that sanctity is accessible, concrete and urgent in our times. It is not about spectacular gestures, but about faithfulness - choosing God in the small decisions, caring for the neighbour, being consistent.

Chi viene a Napoli piange due volte: quando arriva e quando parte.

The one who comes to Naples cries twice: when they arrive and when they leave.

This famous Neapolitan saying neatly sums up my two-year expatriation to Rome. The manifest intention was to earn a Licentiate in Theology (with a specialisation in Liturgy) from the Pontifical University of the Holy Cross. However, along the way, I was taught much more than the divine cure of sacred rites for a technologically oversaturated and socio-culturally fatigued city.

Living in Rome boosts one's languages, opening up connections with the living and the dead (I mean authors!). These encounters bring resolution to our Eastern sensibilities which are amiss until we assimilate the West. The Indian spice palate gets tempered by the humble flavours of their pizza-pasta-bruschetta and risotto-cannoli-gelato. One discovers wisdom in her history, embossed on every street corner and church facade, entombed in every statue and relic, fountain and monument. A simple walk, from the ruins that was once Rome to St Peter's on the other side of the river Tiber, tangibly

demonstrates how God has always been turning peripheries into centres. It would take many other essays to eke out my experiences with shrines and necropolises, Eucharistic miracles and incorruptible bodies, papal funerals and conclaves, hikes and rides. And when you think I am done I can still go on about Venice and Sicily, Assisi and Napoli, Milan and the Dolomites, Pio and Padua, Verona and Ravenna, Virgil and Dante, even Serie A and Jannik Sinner! A Roman Latin saying sums up my travels succinctly: Veni, Vidi, Vici (I came, I saw, I conquered)



It reminds individual Christians and the entire Church, the community of the baptized, of our fundamental vocation to be, in the footsteps of Christ, messengers and builders of hope. I trust that it will be for everyone a time of grace with the faithful God who has given us new birth in the risen Christ "to a living"

hope"

1. In the footsteps of Christ our hope:

In his earthly life, "he went about doing good and healing all" from evil and the Evil One (cf. Acts 10:38), restoring hope in God to the needy and the people. He became the divine Missionary of hope, the supreme model of all those down the centuries who carry out their own God-given mission, even amid extreme trials.

May we too feel inspired to set out in the footsteps of the Lord Jesus to become, with him and in him, signs and messengers of hope for all, in every place and circumstance that God has granted us to live. May all the baptized, as missionary Disciples of Christ, make his hope shine forth in every corner of the earth!

2. Christians, bearers and builders of hope among all peoples:

The horizon of this hope transcends the passing things of this world and opens up to those divine realities in which we share even nowImpelled by this great hope, Christian communities can be harbingers of a new humanity in a world that, in the most "developed" areas, shows serious symptoms of human crisis: a widespread sense of bewilderment, loneliness and indifference to the needs of the elderly, and a reluctance to make an effort to assist our neighbours in need
