



There is no perfect couple, there's no perfect marriage but with God in our midst, we can make it work. With God on our side, we can withstand the challenges of today's modern, materialistic world which prompts us to believe in a 'godless world'.

Finally, we need to understand the importance of forgiveness. It is said, "a successful marriage isn't the union of two perfect people. It's that of two imperfect people who have learned the value of forgiveness and grace".

So, imperfect though we may be, striving to attain marital bliss should be the goal of married couples.



Living a Christian Marriage in Today's World

We understand Marriage as a Sacrament and a lifelong commitment. Marriage is a sacred covenant, a commitment for a lifetime that reflects God's love, human faithfulness and stability. In today's fast-paced and everchanging world, sustaining a Christian marriage requires intentionality, grace, and dependence on God. Here are key biblical principles and practical steps to nurture and strengthen a Christian marriage.

1. Prioritizing God in Marriage: A Christ-centred marriage begins with a strong individual relationship with God. Matthew 6:33 reminds us, "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." After personal prayer, we need to talk about regular Spousal & family prayer. Couples should make prayer, Bible study, and participating in the sacramental life of the parish church a core part of their marriage, fostering spiritual intimacy and unity. Families that pray and eat together, stay together.

- 2. Practicing Love and Respect: Ephesians 5:33 instructs, "Each one of you also must love his wife as he loves himself, and the wife must respect her husband." Husbands are called to love their wives sacrificially, just as Christ loved the church, and wives are called to respect their husbands. This mutual love and respect build a foundation for trust and understanding. Mutual respect and Basic trust are corner stones of a loving Christian marriage.
- 3. Effective Communication: Open and honest communication is essential in any relationship. James 1:19 advises, "Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry." Couples should strive for active listening, expressing their thoughts with kindness, and resolving conflicts in a Christ-honouring way. Good communication skills and conflict management skills are essential part of sustaining a marital relationship.

4. Commitment to Forgiveness and Grace:

Marriage involves two imperfect people, they will hurt each other thus making forgiveness a necessity. Colossians 3:13 says, "Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive, as the Lord forgave you." Extending grace and letting go of past hurts allows for healing and growth. Unresolved conflicts, unmet needs and unforgiving issues is baggage many couples carry and sabotage the present and future. When you forgive, you in no way change the past – but you sure do change the future.(Bernard Meltzer)

- 5. Intimacy: Nurturing union of mind, body and spirit : God designed marriage to be a union of mind, body and spirit. emotional physical Intellectual, and closeness is ingredient of a good marriage. 1 Corinthians 7:3-5 encourages couples to fulfil their marital duties to one another. Regularly spending quality time together, expressing affection, and maintaining physical intimacy help sustain a healthy and intimate marriage. When married couples find it difficult to be vulnerable and intimate, points to a grave problem in the spousal relationship. Couples need to seek help.
- 6. Handling Finances with Wisdom: Financial stress can strain a marriage. Proverbs 22:7 warns, "The borrower is slave to the lender." Couples should practice good stewardship, set financial goals together, and seek God's wisdom in managing their resources.
- 7. Guarding Against Infidelity: Marriages face challenges from worldly influences and temptations. 1 Corinthians 10:13 reminds us that God provides a way to resist temptation. Setting boundaries, being accountable, and avoiding situations that compromise integrity help protect the marriage.
- 8.BuildingaSupportiveCommunity:Good couple friends and a supportive community helps sustain a marriage. Surrounding a marriage with positive influences is vital. Hebrews 10:24-25 encourages believers to support one another. Being involved in a church community, seeking mentorship, and engaging with other Christian couples provide encouragement and accountability.
- 9. Keeping a Heart of Gratitude: Grateful

spouses build loving families. Gratitude strengthens a marriage by shifting focus from what is lacking to the blessings within the relationship. 1 Thessalonians 5:18 says, "Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." Expressing appreciation fosters joy and contentment in marriage. Couples should affirm and appreciate each other every day.

10. Persevering Through challenges: Every marriage faces challenges, but perseverance strengthens the bond. Romans 5:3-4 states, "Suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope." Trusting God through trials and working together as a team deepens love and faith. Married couples are called to be "Pilgrims of hope" shepherding their families to greener pastures.

Last word: Many couples are struggling in their marriage because they are trying to run their marriage on their own steam and not making God and the community part of their journey. Sustaining a Christian marriage in today's world requires commitment, faith, and reliance on God's wisdom. By prioritizing Christ, practicing love and respect, communicating effectively, and embracing forgiveness, couples can build a marriage that glorifies God and stands the test of time. Every Christian couple and their family are called to give witness to Christ and strengthen the domestic church and parish community. The Parish church has a duty to journey with the family at every stage of its development and protect the most precious gift - marriage and family. "The future of humanity passes by the way of the family ..." (St. John Paul II in Familiaris Consortio # 86)

Extracts from Pope Francis' Message for the World Day of the Sick which Coincides with the Feast of Our Patroness, Our Lady of Lourdes

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

We are celebrating the 33rd World Day of the Sick in the Jubilee Year 2025, in which the Church invites us to become "pilgrims of hope". The word of God accompanies us and offers us, in the words of Saint Paul, an encouraging message: "Hope does not disappoint" (Rom 5:5); indeed, it strengthens us in times of trial.

Let us reflect on how God remains close to those who are suffering in three particular ways: through encounter, gift and sharing.

Encounter: When Jesus sent the seventytwo disciples out on mission (cf. Lk 10:1-9), He told them to proclaim to the sick: "The Kingdom of God has come near to you" (v. 9). He asks them, in other words, to help the sick to see their infirmity, however painful and incomprehensible it may be, as an opportunity to encounter the Lord. In times of illness, we sense our human frailty on the physical, psychological and spiritual levels. Yet we also experience the closeness and compassion of God, who, in Jesus, shared in our human suffering. God does not abandon us and often amazes us by granting us a strength that we never expected, and would never have found on our own.

Gift: The second way that God is close to the suffering: as gift. More than anything else, suffering makes us aware that hope comes from the Lord. It is thus, first and foremost, a gift to be received and cultivated, by remaining "faithful to the faithfulness of God"

Sharing: God's third way of being close to us: through sharing. Places of suffering are frequently also places of sharing and mutual enrichment. How often, at the bedside of the sick, do we learn to hope, by our closeness to those who suffer, do we learn to have faith and when we care for those in need, do we discover love! We realize that we are "angels" of hope and messengers of God for one another, all of us together: whether patients, physicians, nurses, family members, friends, priests, men and women religious, no matter where we are, whether in the family or in clinics, nursing homes, hospitals or medical centres...

Dear brothers and sisters who are ill or who care for the suffering, in this Jubilee you play an especially important part. Your journey together is a sign for everyone: "a hymn to human dignity, a song of hope" I remember you always in my prayers. I entrust you to Our Lady, Health of the Sick, in the words that we have addressed to her in their hour of need:

We fly to your protection, O Holy Mother of God. Do not despise our petitions in our necessities, but deliver us always from all dangers, O glorious and blessed Virgin. Amen.

Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes & World Day of the Sick

The feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, celebrated on 11th February, commemorates the first appearance of the Blessed Virgin Mary, in 1858, to a 14-year-old French girl, (St.) Bernadette Soubirous, in a cave of Massabielle while she was gathering firewood with her sister and a friend. Little Bernadette continued to receive appearances over the following few days. Eventually our Lady revealed herself to her as the "Immaculate Conception", asking Bernadette to drink from a fountain. The girl was confused as there was no fountain and so started digging until she discovered the natural spring of Lourdes, to which pilgrims still travel today for healing. The first case of healing was recognised four vears later as the first miracle at Lourdes. Many healings have been reported since and thousands of pilgrims have reported of being deeply changed by visiting this site.

Lourdes has become a place of pilgrimage and healing, but even more of faith. To people of faith this is not surprising. It is a continuation of Jesus' healing miracles – now performed at the intercession of his blessed mother. Pope Pius X, in 1907, introduced the feast of the apparition of the Immaculate Virgin of Lourdes. Several parishes around the world are named after Our Lady of Lourdes and celebrate this special day as their feast. In 1992, Pope St. John Paul II decreed the Feast day of Our Lady of Lourdes to also be the World Day of the Sick.

Every year pilgrims flock to this site on this day and have been touched by the power of what happens here. Large number of sick and ailing people gather to be healed, and hundreds of teenage volunteers from all over assist wheelchairs into the shrine each night, bearing testimony to the fact that the Church is so globally connected. "It was an incredible experience. The help received from volunteers was heartwarming. They helped me in and out of the waters that, despite the chilly weather, did not feel cold. Felt rejuvenated and blessed!" (Bertha Barretto, Parishioner).

We, in Orlem, are blessed to have Our Lady of Lourdes as the patron of our Parish. Happy Feast.

EMHC Retreat at Vinayalaya

Our Parish organized a Eucharistic Retreat for the EMHC at the Vinayalaya Retreat House, Andheri. 41 of us attended. Fr. Sumit Dsouza SJ prepared and conducted this two - day Silent Ignatian Retreat. Some key insights from the enlightening retreat sessions are as follows:

Retreat – It was a personal invitation from God for each of us to return to Him from our sinful ways. We had to surrender our phones, remain silent throughout the retreat, and speak only when absolutely necessary. This allowed us to truly experience and hear the voice of God while gaining a deeper understanding of our thoughts, emotions, senses and imagination. In silence, we confront the reality of life.

We learnt that the Eucharist is a **Meal**, **Sacrifice and Sacrament** - a reality that is re-lived at every celebration. It is where we bring our lives, along with all our struggles and difficulties, to the altar, uniting them with bread and wine.

In the Eucharist, Christ is present in

- (1) The Word of God
- (2) The Priest
- (3) Bread and Wine
- (4) People

The Holy Mass is broken down into 5 parts:

- (1) Introduction
- (2) Liturgy of the Word
- (3) Liturgy of the Eucharist
- (4) Communion Rites
- (5) Conclusion Rites

The Preacher emphasized on examination of our Conscience to know the presence of God in our lives. He gave us an acronym - **TORCH** (T – Thanksgiving, O – Openness to the Holy Spirit,

R – Re-live your day, C – Contrite (sorry), H – Hope for tomorrow). He told us that we need to examine our conscience for 10 minutes every day before we go to bed.

In prayer, our focus should not be on repetitive prayer. Emphasis should be given

to Contemplative prayer i.e. pause and reflect, allowing your imagination to be free. It should be used to contemplate Jesus in the Gospels – imagining scenes from his life. (Passion narrative, action scenes). We need to know that Jesus is with us in our sufferings and 'Suffering' is a part of our Christian Life. If our Lord and Master Jesus Christ has suffered, we too will suffer as his true disciples.


Towards the end of the Retreat there were many questions to ponder on. The one which touched me was, "What will I do for Christ?"

Another key takeaway was the importance

of stepping aside and allowing God to be at the center, taking control of our lives. With Him, everything else will fall into place.

Retrouvaille - A Journey of Rediscovery and Renewal

We got married in December 1999 and recently celebrated our Silver Wedding Anniversary. Like most marriages after the initial years of romance, togetherness and unity we faced multiple challenges due to each of us taking the other for granted, giving importance to other duties such as our careers, children and various other reasons. Over the years this led to a breakdown in communication, with each of us leading our own individual life while staying under the same roof.

Our marriage, once full of promise, had become a fragile thread barely holding us together. The weight of unspoken resentments, constant miscommunication, and years of growing apart had brought us to a breaking point. The Retrouvaille program was recommended and was described as a lifeline for couples in crisis. Sceptical but desperate, we decided to give it one last try. That decision changed the course of our marriage—and our lives.

The Retrouvaille weekend program was eye-opening. For the first time in years, we weren't just talking at each other but truly listening. The program didn't just highlight our differences but helped us understand them. Through heartfelt presentations by other couples who had once been in similar places, we realized we weren't alone in our struggles. We learned the power of forgiveness—not just for our partner but also for ourselves. It was liberating to let go of past hurts and rediscover the love that had always been there but buried under years of bitterness.

The post-weekend sessions were just as crucial. They gave us the tools to build on what we had learned and keep the momentum going. Slowly but surely, we began rebuilding trust, prioritizing our communication, and nurturing our relationship in ways we hadn't in decades.

Now, more than a decade later, we look back on that pivotal year with gratitude. Retrouvaille didn't just save our marriage; it transformed it. Our relationship today is stronger, deeper, and more meaningful than we ever thought possible. We've learned that marriage is a journey, not a destination—and like any journey, it has its challenges. But now we face those challenges as a team, united in love and understanding.

To anyone who feels like their marriage is beyond repair, we offer this: HOPE. Retrouvaille gave us that hope, and it can do the same for you.

Conversations in the Spirit - A Method for our Meetings

"Conversations in the Spirit" has emerged as a new method of proceeding on the path of synodality, initiated in 2021 by the Synodal Assembly in Rome. It is a practice of inviting the Holy Spirit into our conversations so that the Spirit may guide, unite and direct us on the way forward. This practice may be used in any circumstance and situation in parishes, communities, cells & associations and even in our own families, when we have a decision to make or there is a conflict or disagreement, for which we seek the help of our Heavenly Father to open up new ways, which we thought would not be possible.

The Method: We start with a specific question that we would like to discern about. For example, how can our parish be more missionary? Or as a family, where should we send our children to school? Once we have our question for discernment, here are some basic steps for having a conversation in the Spirit.

First, prepare yourself personally. Entrust the conversation to God and the Holy Spirit, reflect in prayer on the question for discernment, also reading the Word of God for some inspiration. Ask God to guide you and the whole group to follow His will.

Second, **listen to the Word** of God together as a group. Choose a fitting passage from Scripture for the question at hand. Pray, sing, be united in God.

Third, each person then has the opportunity to share what God has been saying to him/ her about the question. A large group may be divided into smaller

groups. During this first round of sharing, each person has a turn to speak without being interrupted by any other member of the group. One after the other each person shares until everyone speaks. A moment of silence follows so that what others have said can resonate with us.

Fourth, now each person **briefly responds** to what struck him/her about what others just shared. A time of silence again, to listen in our hearts to what has been shared in this second round.

Fifth, the last stage of the conversation in the Spirit is a free exchange among participants, dialoguing with another on the basis of what has emerged in order to discern and gather together the fruit of the conversation in the Spirit that has just taken place. We recognize common points and differences between us. We try and hear what the Holy Spirit is saying to the group so that we can move forward in a common direction. We ask ourselves: "What steps is the Holy Spirit calling us to take together?" And finally, we conclude with a prayer or song of thanksgiving to God.

Having conversations in the Spirit opens up a space for us, a spiritual atmosphere, an "unexpected direction" where true discernment can unfold so that we can move forward together. Conversing with one another, in the Spirit, bears fruit as we put into action what we have heard the Lord speaking to us in our very midst. "Come Holy Spirit, come inhabit our conversations".

Annual Events: Recollections, picnics, and retreats to strengthen our faith.


